Request

In summary, you asked us:

"Could you kindly supply the following information for the following time periods –

- 1st April 2020 to 31st March 2021
- 1st April 2021 to 31st March 2022
- 1st April 2022 to 31st March 2023
- 1st April 2023 to current date (10th January 2024)
- 1) The total number of Subject Access Requests (also known as DSARS) received
- 2) The total number of Subject Access Requests (also known as DSARS) received where they have been refused by the ICO as 'manifestly unfounded'
- 3) The total number of Subject Access Requests (also known as DSARS) received where they have been refused by the ICO as 'manifestly excessive'"

We have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (the FOIA).

Our response

We have searched our records based on the information you provided and can confirm that we hold some information within the scope of your request.

Our request handling system records which legislation a request is made under, but not which specific part of the legislation it relates to. That is, we record is a request is made under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), the Environmental Information Regulations (EIR), or the UK GDPR, but not more granular reasons for their request. This means that for information requests made under UK GDPR, unless we check every request individually, we are not able to determine if they relate specifically to Article 15 (the Right of Access), or another part of the Regulations, such as Article 17 (the Right to Erasure).

As can be seen by the number of information requests received under UK GPDR per year, taking the time to check each individual request would be highly likely



to exceed the 18 hour time limit for searching for information laid out in section 12 of the FOIA and in the Freedom of Information and Data Protection (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulations 2004.

Therefore, we have provided below the total number of information requests we have received under UK GDPR. Please be aware that these numbers include requests under all parts of the Regulations, not just requests under the Right of Access, and could include requests for information erasure or rectification.
