# DATA CONTROLLER STUDY -**QUALITATIVE INTERVIEWS**

We did not change.


... we were already compliant.

4 out of 10 organisations face DP compliance costs



Overall, organisations recognize that there are costs in complying with legislation, however, these costs are not the biggest constraints for their activities
