Executive summary



Audit Methodology

The Information Commissioner is responsible for enforcing and promoting compliance with the UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR), the Data Protection Act 2018 (DPA 2018) and other data protection legislation. Section 146 of the DPA 2018 provides the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) with the power to conduct compulsory audits through the issue of assessment notices. Section 129 of the DPA 2018 allows the ICO to carry out consensual audits.

The ICO is an independent, proportionate regulator and sees auditing as a constructive process with real benefits for controllers and so aims to establish a participative approach. High standards of personal data protection compliance help organisations innovate and deliver great services by building trust with the public. The ICO's expertise and consistent approach to regulation provides certainty enabling organisations to feel confident to use personal data responsibly, innovate and support economic growth.

Durham Constabulary (DC) agreed to a consensual audit of its data protection practices.

The purpose of the audit is to provide the Information Commissioner and DC with an independent assurance of the extent to which DC, within the scope of this agreed audit, is complying with data protection legislation.

The scope areas covered by this audit are determined following a risk based analysis of DC's processing of personal data. The scope may take into account any data protection issues or risks which are specific to DC, identified from ICO intelligence or DC's own concerns, or any data protection issues or risks which affect its specific sector or organisations more widely. area to take into account the organisational structure of DC, the nature and extent of DC's processing of personal data, and to avoid duplication across scope areas. As such, the scope of this audit is unique to DC.

It was agreed that the audit would focus on the following area:

Scope area	Description
Personal Data Breach	The extent to which the organisation has measures in place to detect, assess and
Management and	respond to security breaches involving personal data, to record them appropriately
Reporting	and notify the supervisory authority and individuals where appropriate.

Audits are conducted following the Information Commissioner's data protection audit methodology. The key elements of this are a desk-based review of selected policies and procedures, remote interviews with selected staff, and a virtual review of evidential documentation.

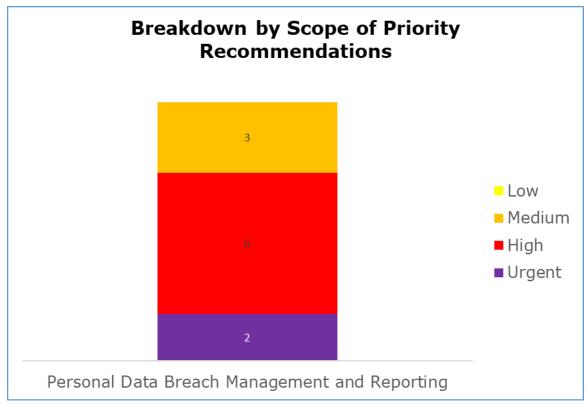
Where weaknesses were identified recommendations have been made, primarily around enhancing existing processes to facilitate compliance with data protection legislation. In order to assist DC in implementing the recommendations each has been assigned a priority rating based upon the risks that they are intended to address. The ratings are assigned based upon the ICO's assessment of the risks involved. DC's priorities and risk appetite may vary and, therefore, they should undertake their own assessments of the risks identified.

Audit Summary

Audit Scope area	Assurance Rating	Overall Opinion
Personal Data Breach Management and Reporting	Reasonable	There is a reasonable level of assurance that processes and procedures are in place and are delivering data protection compliance. The audit has identified some scope for improvement in existing arrangements to reduce the risk of non-compliance with data protection legislation.

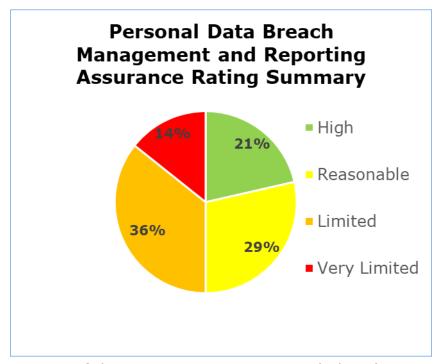
Priority Recommendations



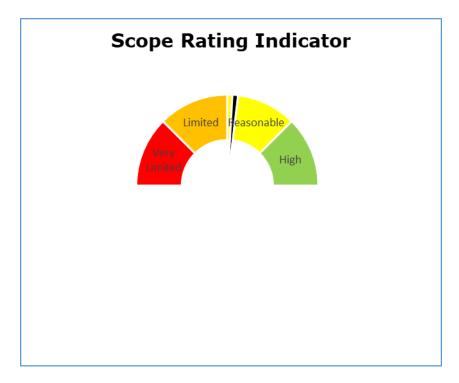
The bar chart above shows a breakdown by scope area of the priorities assigned to our recommendations made:

The pie chart above shows a summary of the assurance ratings awarded in the Personal Data Breach Management and Reporting scope. 21% high assurance, 29% reasonable assurance, 36% limited assurance, 14% very limited assurance.



The speedometer chart above gives a gauge of where DC sits on our assurance rating scale from high assurance to very limited assurance.

Areas for Improvement

- Personal Data Breach (PDB) processes are currently outlined briefly in various policies; however, DC does not have a PDB specific policy or procedure that is formally documented.
- DC has a log of PDBs in place, however it should look to regularly produce figures and statistics from this to be analysed and reported to a relevant Board in order to provide sufficient oversight and review trends.
- DC currently hold regular HIT training sessions related to information security and data breaches, which are available to all staff, though attendance is not currently monitored. However, it has no formal internal training for staff on personal data breach management and reporting. DC should complete a Training Needs Analysis and use that to create internal training suitable to people's roles.
- Information Asset Registers are currently being reviewed and brought up to date. DC should ensure that this review forms part of a complete data mapping exercise and feeds into its RoPA, in order to minimise the risk of gaps in its awareness of the data being processed by the force. This would assist it in sufficiently managing and mitigating risks around PDBs.
