Executive summary



Audit Methodology

The Information Commissioner is responsible for enforcing and promoting compliance with the UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR), the Data Protection Act 2018 (DPA 2018) and other data protection legislation. Section 146 of the DPA 2018 provides the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) with the power to conduct compulsory audits through the issue of assessment notices. Section 129 of the DPA 2018 allows the ICO to carry out consensual audits.

The ICO is an independent, proportionate regulator and sees auditing as a constructive process with real benefits for controllers and so aims to establish a participative approach. High standards of personal data protection compliance help organisations innovate and deliver great services by building trust with the public. The ICO's expertise and consistent approach to regulation provides certainty enabling organisations to feel confident to use personal data responsibly, innovate and support economic growth.

Merseyside Police (MP) agreed to a consensual audit of its data protection practices.

The purpose of the audit is to provide the Information Commissioner and MP with an independent assurance of the extent to which MP, within the scope of this agreed audit, is complying with data protection legislation.

The scope areas covered by this audit are determined following a risk-based analysis of MP's processing of personal data. The scope may take into account any data protection issues or risks which are specific to MP, identified from ICO intelligence or MP's own concerns, or any data protection issues or risks which affect its specific sector or organisations more widely. The ICO has further tailored the controls covered in each scope area to take into account the organisational structure of MP, the nature and extent of MP's processing of personal data, and to avoid duplication across scope areas. As such, the scope of this audit is unique to MP.

It was agreed that the audit would focus on the following area:

Scope area	Description
Personal Data Breach Management and Reporting	The extent to which the organisation has measures in place to detect, assess and respond to security breaches involving personal data, to record them appropriately and notify the supervisory authority and individuals where appropriate

Audits are conducted following the Information Commissioner's data protection audit methodology. The key elements of this are a desk-based review of selected policies and procedures, remote interviews with selected staff, and a virtual review of evidential documentation.

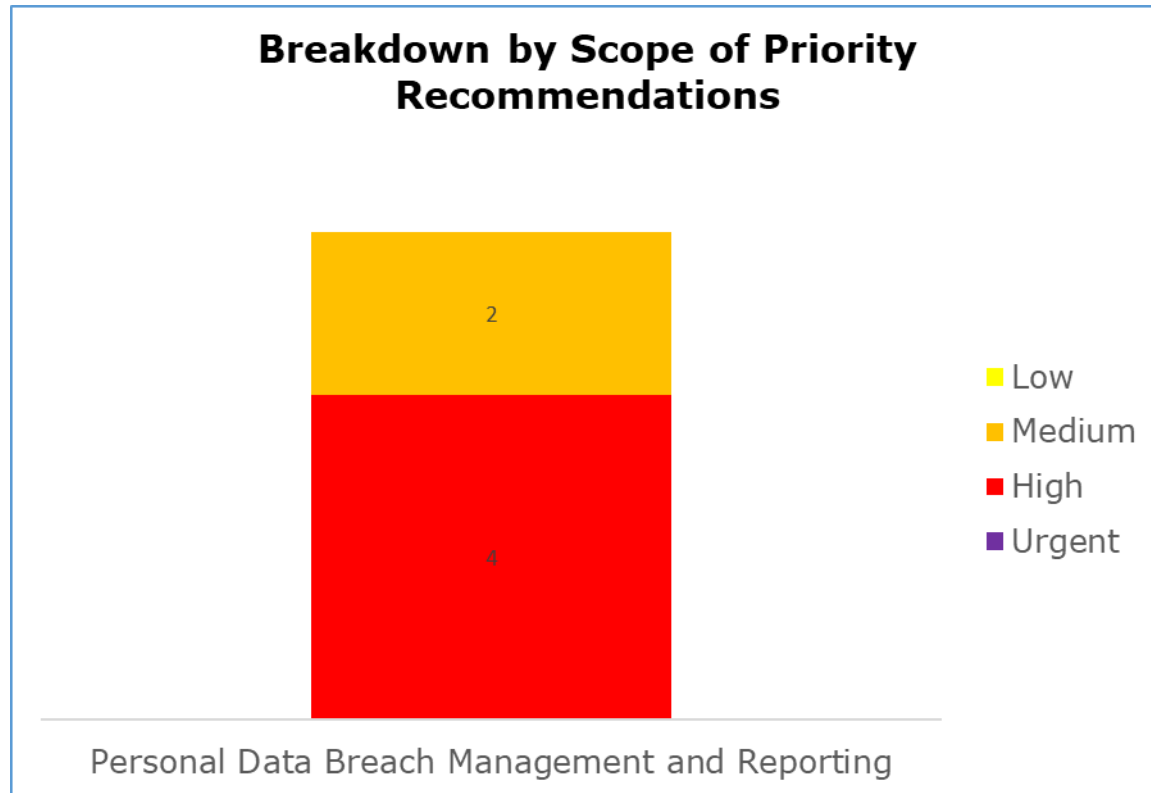
Where weaknesses were identified recommendations have been made, primarily around enhancing existing processes to facilitate compliance with data protection legislation. In order to assist MP in implementing the recommendations each has been assigned a priority rating based upon the risks that they are intended to address. The ratings are assigned based upon the ICO's assessment of the risks involved. MP's priorities and risk appetite may vary and, therefore, they should undertake their own assessments of the risks identified.

Audit Summary

Audit Scope area	Assurance Rating	Overall Opinion
Personal Data Breach Management and Reporting	Reasonable	There is a reasonable level of assurance that processes and procedures are in place and are delivering data protection compliance. The audit has identified some scope for improvement in existing arrangements to reduce the risk of non-compliance with data protection legislation.

The assurance ratings above are reflective of the remote audit methodology deployed and the rating may not necessarily represent a comprehensive assessment of compliance.

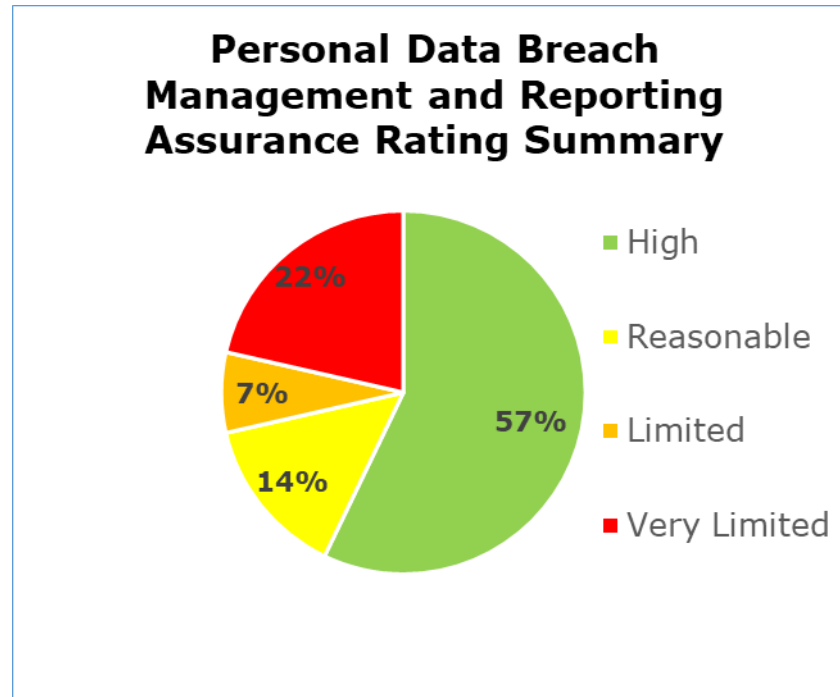
Priority Recommendations

The pie chart above shows a summary of the assurance ratings awarded in the Personal Data Breach Management scope. 57% high assurance, 14% reasonable assurance, 7% limited assurance and 22% very limited assurance.

Areas for improvement

- Ensure there is bespoke training developed specifically covering MP's internal personal data breach (PDB) processes for all staff, and specialist training for staff involved in decision making around PDBs. All training should be refreshed at regular intervals as appropriate.
- Apply data minimisation techniques and set a defined retention period for data breach logs and review them regularly to ensure compliance with Article 5(1)(e) of the UKGDPR and section 39 of the DPA18
- Create a template for communicating to affected data subjects in the event of a PDB and ensure the process is formally documented within a policy and/or procedure.
